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New Program at Olympia University Gives Students a Second Chance

Olympia University hosts night classes and creates new financial aid program and low interest loans for low-income households.

Olympia University created a new high school program to recover high school dropout problems and increase university attendance in the area.

This program allows students to have a second chance at higher education. As a university, Olympia will create high school courses for English, American history, mathematics and general science. Initially, Olympia University plans to accept 300 students into the high school program. To qualify for college courses, students must attain a B average in the program. Students qualifying for college courses are eligible for financial aid and low-interest loans.

"We believe the university has an obligation to its wider community and not just to those who teach, work or study on campus. We are members of that community," said Dr. Foster L. Fogbottom, President of Olympia University, "In this part of our state, we have an acute problem that can be addressed by our reaching out to those who need help. We believe that within 10 years, this program can become a national model for other programs in economically depressed areas."

The goal of the program is to allow high school dropouts the ability to complete a high school diploma and four semesters of college in six years, providing them with a second chance.
